



MCWA Announces March Public Meeting

The Muncy Creek Watershed Association will be holding a public meeting at the Hughesville Public Library on March 12th at 7:00 PM. The meeting will highlight activities of the group and PA Game Commission, Wildlife Conservation Officer, Jonathan Wyant, will provide an in-depth program on the reintroduction and life habits of the Pennsylvania Fisher. The fisher is the second largest member of the weasel family in Pennsylvania. The MCWA hopes to see you at the meeting.



Reintroduction of the fisher occurred through natural dispersal of populations in New York State and the joint project between the PA Game Commission and Penn State University when 190 fishers were reintroduced in six sites of northern PA from 1994-1998.

LCWA to Hold Informational Meeting on April 14th

The Loyalsock Creek Watershed Association will be holding a open meeting on April 14th at the Plunkett's Creek Fire Hall in Barbours. The meeting will begin at 6:30 PM.

The meeting will provide updates as to the activities of the association and then will feature a program provided by

the Susquehanna River Basin Commission (SRBC). The SRBC is charged with reviewing and approving water withdrawals from locations within the Susquehanna River Watershed. Currently, there are two applications for large water withdrawals in the Loyalsock watershed. The SRBC will detail the

process they use to review and determine the effect of a large water withdrawal on a given water body. The LCWA has provided comments to SRBC on the pending applications and would like its membership to be aware of the decision making of issues in the area. The LCWA looks forward to seeing you at the meeting.

Deciduous

Red Oak – (2-0) 10-20" seedlings. It has a fast growth to 75'. It will grow in wet areas, best in rich soils in full sun. It will tolerate urban conditions. It is a very valuable timber tree.

Chestnut Oak – (2-0) 24-36" seedlings, can grow 60-70' tall. Grow in moderate to poor soils.

Sugar Maple – (2-0) 10-20" seedlings, can grow to 75'. It does not do well in wet areas. Native, provides products from sap in the spring.

Evergreens

Norway Spruce – (4-0) 15-30" seedlings, can grow to 150', 6' in 6-7 years. Good for Christmas trees, timber and windbreaks. Thrives in ordinary soils. Needs good moisture to keep green color. Space 6' apart.

Eastern Red Cedar – (3-0) 10/20" seedlings, grows 30-40 ft. Fragrant and varies in color. Resistant to extremes of drought, heat, and cold.

Concolor Fir – (3-0) 12-24" seedlings, can grow to 100'. Easy to care for. Very good as Christmas trees. Needs good drainage.

Eastern White Pine – (4-0) 12-24" seedlings, can grow to 50 ft., extremely hardy, will grow in moist soils and well drained, tolerates heat and drought. It will grow where many others will not.

Semi-Dwarf Trees

Two year tree pruned to a 5/8" to 3/4" branch, 4'-6' high. Most require two different varieties for proper pollination.

Apple Trees

Northern Spy – Crisp, tender all-purpose. Blooms late, avoiding most late spring frosts. Ripens in late October. Superior winter apple.

Granny Smith – Green heavy bearing. Tart flavor really lasts, and stays fresh all winter and spring, good all-purpose apple. Ripens late October.

Red Stayman – Stayman Winesaps are a medium to large apple with a green-yellow skin that is mostly covered by dull red splashes. Blooms mid-April, bloom color of light pink to white. Ripens in mid-October.

Dark Red Delicious – Fruit is firm with very dark red skin, and five "points" on the bottom. Dark Red Delicious has white flesh that is aromatic and sweet, with a bit of a crunchy texture to it. Keeps very well, and is often used for decoration. Bloom time mid-April with bloom color light pink to white. Pollination is Diploid. Ripens mid-September.

Bover McIntosh – Skin is intense red, with almost a touch of purple over a green base with touches of gold; taste is bold, sweet-sour, and somewhat acidic; texture is soft, with very aromatic flesh. Bloom time mid-season with bloom color white. Diploid which requires another variety to pollinate. Ripens late season, October (South Central PA).

Number of 2 Year Fertilizer Tablets per Size Plant

Blueberry Bushes

Thrive almost anywhere in acid soil; in alkaline soils, add aluminum sulfate. Plant two different varieties for best results. Like full sun.

2-3 year, 12" - 18"

Blueray – Recommended for the northeast. Highly flavored fruit. Very productive bushes, free from disease. Ripens early to Mid-July.

Duke - Known for extremely large fruit, ripens Mid-July.

Raspberries

Red and Gold should not be planted within 50' of Black.

Heritage Red Raspberry - #1 Tips. Everbearing. Produce large firm excellent quality fruit. Start ripening early July.

Jewel Black Raspberry - Large, firm berries of superior quality. The plant is vigorous, consistently productive, resistant to anthracnose and widely adapted. Excellent flavor.

Strawberries

Seascape – Everbearing and cold hardy.

Native/Wildlife/Stream Enhancement

Tulip Poplar – (2-0) 20-30" seedlings, can grow to 150'. Rapid growth in light well drained soils. Very valuable hardwood timber.

Sawtooth Oak – (2-0) 8-16" seedlings. Fast growth to 70 feet.

Tolerates most soils. Space 20 feet apart for best acorn production. Should produce within 7-10 years. Excellent for WILDLIFE.

American Cranberry – (3-0) 10-20" seedlings. Shrub that can grow to 12 ft. Red berries provide food for birds, excellent wetland species.

White Flowering Dogwood – (2-0) 8-18" seedlings. Grows up to 30 ft. tall. Dark green foliage turning scarlet red in the fall. Clusters of white flowers bloom in May. Red clusters of berries in the fall.

Black Chokeberry – (3-0) 20-35" seedlings.

Winterberry – (3-0) 8-18" seedlings. It is a good wetland plant. It likes acid soils and a native to the area. 5-10 plants should be planted, only female plant produces berries. It is ATTRACTIVE TO WILDLIFE.

Witchazel – (2-0) 20-35" seedlings. Small tree or tall shrub is often multi-trunked, usually grows 10-15 ft. tall but can reach 35 ft. in height.

Large, crooked, spreading branches form an irregular, open crown. Floral display of witch hazel is unique. Its fragrant, yellow flowers with strap-like, crumpled petals appear in the fall, persisting for some time after leaf drop. Lettuce-green, deciduous leaves maintain a rich consistency into fall when they turn brilliant gold. Bark is smooth and gray.

Butternut – (1-0) 12-24" seedlings. Grows 40 to 60 feet. Spread 30 to 50 feet. Prefers moist, rich, well-drained soil, but also tolerates drier, rocky soil conditions. Trees should begin to bear sweet edible fruit within 16 to 20 years.

Sargent Crabapple - (3-0) 12-24" seedlings. Small shrub like tree grows 8-10 feet in height with a wide mounding top. Spread 8-15 feet. Small dark red crabapples appear in fall before the leaves drop. Food for songbirds and wildlife.

Shagbark Hickory – (3-0) 8-12" seedlings. Narrow, upright growth habit. Height to 90 feet. Fall colors are yellow and golden brown tones. Popular for its sweet edible nuts and shredding bark. Nut production should start in 25 -30 years. Plant at least ten for pollination.

American Hazelnut – (1-0) 8-24" seedlings. Also known as Filbert. A multi-stemmed tree growing to 15 ft. Edible nuts.

Elderberry – (2-0) 12-15" seedlings. – Root Stock. It is a fast growing shrub, grown for its clusters of bluish-black berries, which appear in late summer. It is great for jams and for wildlife.

Streamco Willow – (3-0) 12-18" seedlings. Should reach 12-15 ft. Narrow lustrous dark blue-green leaves with light gray or live-gray stems. Extremely fast growth. Prefers cleared, moist soil along stream banks. Disease and insect resistant.

Wild Senna – (4-0) seedlings. A sturdy, upright growing, unbranched perennial plant with very attractive foliage. This bushy mound grows to a height of 4 to 6 feet. Spread 2 to 3 feet. Native to eastern North America. The dark green, compound foliage has an exotic look and gives a feathery appearance when viewed from a distance. Golden-yellow flower spikes appear in July and August lasting approximately one month. In autumn the golden tones are repeated as the foliage turns color. Drought resistant. Plant in full sun. Prefers rich, loamy soil. Attracts butterflies, songbirds and bumble bees. Provides shelter for birds and offers up a nutritious meal of the large chocolate colored seeds. Use as a cut flower, unique specimen or background plant. A striking appearance in flower gardens because of the showy flowers.

Northeast Perennial & Annual Wildflower Mix

9% Comflower; Lance Leaved Coreopsis; 8% Perennial Blue Flax; 6% Wallflower; Bigleaf Lupine; Sulfur Cosmos; Corn Poppy; Plains Coreopsis; 5% Ox Eyed Daisy; Dame's Rocket; Black Eyed Susan; 4% Purple Coneflower; Bachelor's Button; 3% Annual Gaillardia; 2% Annual Baby's Breath; 2% California Orange Poppy; Grey Headed Coneflower; 1% Brown Eyed Susan; Wild Bergamot.

Food Plot Mix

"Premium" Clover – A blend of Freedom MR Red, Alice White and RegalGraze Ladino clovers suited to most sites in the northeast. Extreme wet or dry locations should be avoided. Soil test to determine lime and fertilizer requirements suggested. Sow at 5-10 lbs per acre early spring on a prepared weed-free seed bed. High-protein clovers are the underpinning to a complete foodplot system.

"Fall Brassica" Blend – a mix of improved brassicas and radish intended for mid-summer, early fall planting. Brassicas gain favor with deer when palatability increases significantly after a few frosts in the fall. Planting too early in the summer should be avoided if attractive forage is to be made available late in the year. Plant 5-6 lbs. per acre on a prepared seed bed. It is the responsibility of the customer to mix the seed before planting.

Dr. Sweeney holds a B.S. in Biology from Delaware Valley College of Science and Agriculture, PA, and a Ph.D. in Biology from the University of Pennsylvania. He received the 2003 “National Award of Excellence in Conservation” from the USDA Natural Resource Conservation Service for his research and work on the restoration of streams and their riparian corridors. In 2006, he received the “Lifetime Achievement Award” from the Chesapeake Bay Foundation. He also serves on the board of directors for the Georgia Farm Foundation (currently President) and as an advisor on the Brandywine Conservancy’s Environmental Committee.

Game of Logging Chainsaw Safety Training

Level 1

Focuses on introducing the participant to open face felling and the development of techniques to safely use it. Topics covered include personal protective equipment, chainsaw safety features, chainsaw reactive forces, bore cutting, pre-planning the fell, and understanding hinge wood strength.

Level 2

Focuses on maximizing chainsaw performance through basic maintenance, carburetor setting, and filing techniques. Limbing and bucking techniques are introduced, spring pole cutting is covered and more felling is practiced.

Level 3

Focuses on techniques for handling difficult trees. Topics covered include limbing, height measurement, segment calculations, wedging techniques and hinge placement. The felling is done against the tree's natural lean and participants also limb and buck using techniques demonstrated in level II.

Level 4

Focuses on ways to maximize a harvest plan for safety and productivity. Felling is practiced at working speed using all the techniques from previous levels. This level is geared towards the "Professional Timber Harvester" user group.

Storm Damage Training

(GOL Levels 1 & 2 required as a prerequisite for this class.)

Storm Damage training provides saw users a number of "tools for the tool box" to be pulled out when they best fit. Techniques covered in this class include; Limb-Loc, Top-Loc, Tongue & Groove, Axle Cut, Axle-Loc, Notch Bucking & Directional Notch Bucking and more.

- Class size is limited to 12 participants.
- Minimum class size of 10 participants.
- Class will be canceled if minimum is not met.
- **Pre-registration and payment is required.**
- Training levels must be taken in order, however, participants are not required to take all 4 levels.
- Each level is a full day (8 hours) & held outside, in all weather conditions.
- Refunds will be made for cancellations received 10 days prior to class.
